
**GLOBALIZATION AND THE LAW:
AN INTRODUCTION**

Globalization is both a concept and a process. As a concept, it has largely happened. Put simply, it marks the increased movement of, and the connection between, goods, services, people, capital, and cultures both between and within regions and countries around the world. There are obviously significant differences between the papers. There is also a unifying theme: the role that law can and should play in the future direction of our global community.

Finally, we hope that the articles included in this issue will not only further our current understanding of the various topics discussed, but will also spark further research, thinking, and dialogue on these and other related issues of globalization and the law.
